Although RHS is known for their state championships for wrestling and for cheer, this school has some other state and even national champions in the building: art and photography students.

During this entire year, art and photo students have been working hard and entering pieces into various art shows and competitions. From Scholastics to the Congressional Art Competition, RHS has winners in almost every competition that they enter.

The most current competition is happening right now.

The Annual 2013 Congressional Artistic Discovery is holding a "Fan Favorite" competition online.

According to Rep. Candice Miller's official Representative page, Candice Miller announced the start of the voting for this year's "Fan Favorite."

Anyone can vote for the pieces entered into the competition via Candice Miller's Facebook page.

All viewers have to do is view the art competition album on Facebook and simply click

"Like" on their favorite piece.

In order for students to be entered into the main competition, certain guidelines must be met. Things like being a high school student and residing in Michigan's Tenth Congressional District are only the beginning. There are size, weight, even dimensional requirements that will either make or break your entry. The winner of the competition will have their winning piece framed and displayed in the Capitol in Lansing for an eleven-month exhibit.

Fourteen students were entered into the competition, and one stood out from the rest. Senior Alex Wofford received an honorable mention for her scratchboard piece titled "Cheli's." The piece is a picture of Cheli's Chili by Comerica Park in Detroit. The art classes took a trip to Detroit to get the pictures.

All pieces entered into the competition are also on display locally at Studio 1219 in Port Huron. The pieces were on display until April 25th.

Another competition that has happened recently is the Annual Macomb County Secondary Student Show. There was a total of nine students who participated in the competition, three of whom were seniors. Seniors Ashley Fanale, Gabby Oddo and Julie McCusiston were students who submitted an entire portfolio.

Work included in the portfolio was put on display at the Anton Art Center in Mount Clemens. The art students recently took a field trip to admire their work that was on display.

"I was really happy and surprised to see my own work because there was a lot of neat work," said senior Julie McCusiston.

The piece of McCusiston's on display was called "The Man and the Barn," a black and white photography piece on film. As a second-year photography student, this was the first time one of Julie's projects has been on display.

"Not everyone's work is showcased. [The committee] picks their favorites and they are awarded. The pieces have to be picked in order to be put on display," said McCusiston. Alex Wofford is another senior who is an avid participant in art shows and competitions. "I have been in art and in competitions for

all four years," said Wofford. In addition to taking art classes at RHS, Wofford has taken private art lessons as well.

This year, Wofford participated in the Scholastic Art and Writing Competition in January and received an additional 'Honorable Mention' for her scratch board piece, "Cheli's."

Senior Rebecca Weishaar participated as well in this competition and received a scholarship for some of her work.

"I plan on going to the College of Creative Studies in Detroit to pursue art," said Weishaar. "I really like being able to express yourself in your own way, through a picture instead of words because there is so much feeling in art," she added.

This year was the first year Rebecca decided to enter her work into art competitions.

"I like entering different shows and getting awards. It gives you a bigger outlook on life," said Weishaar.

Weishaar received a total of three 'Honorable Mentions' for her work included in her portfolio. The portfolios

An additional senior who has turned many heads in the art world this year is Gabby Oddo. In the Scholastics Competition alone, Oddo received two Gold Keys, a Silver Key, a Gold Key for her portfolio, the Ken Hoover Memorial "Best of Show" award, as well as an Honorable Mention. The Best of Show award is one of the most prestigious awards a student can receive at Scholastics competition.

Another impressive award Oddo received was the National Silver Key for her portfolio. After winning the Gold Key at the Regional Competition, Oddo went to the National Competition where she accepted her award. Being nationally recognized for a drawing or a picture doesn't just come over night. Much like the RHS wrestlers of cheerleaders, these art students have had to practice in order to become the champions that they are.

As a final statement, Wofford said, "Always be patient. I love when I get a piece finished, and I feel confident about it."

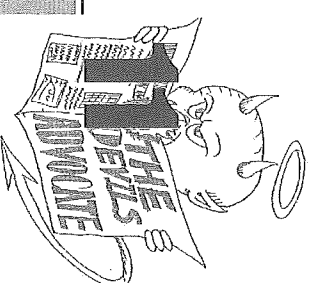

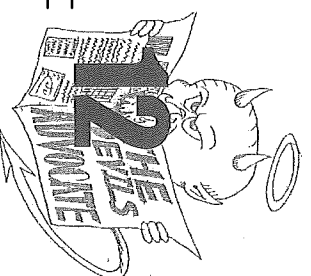
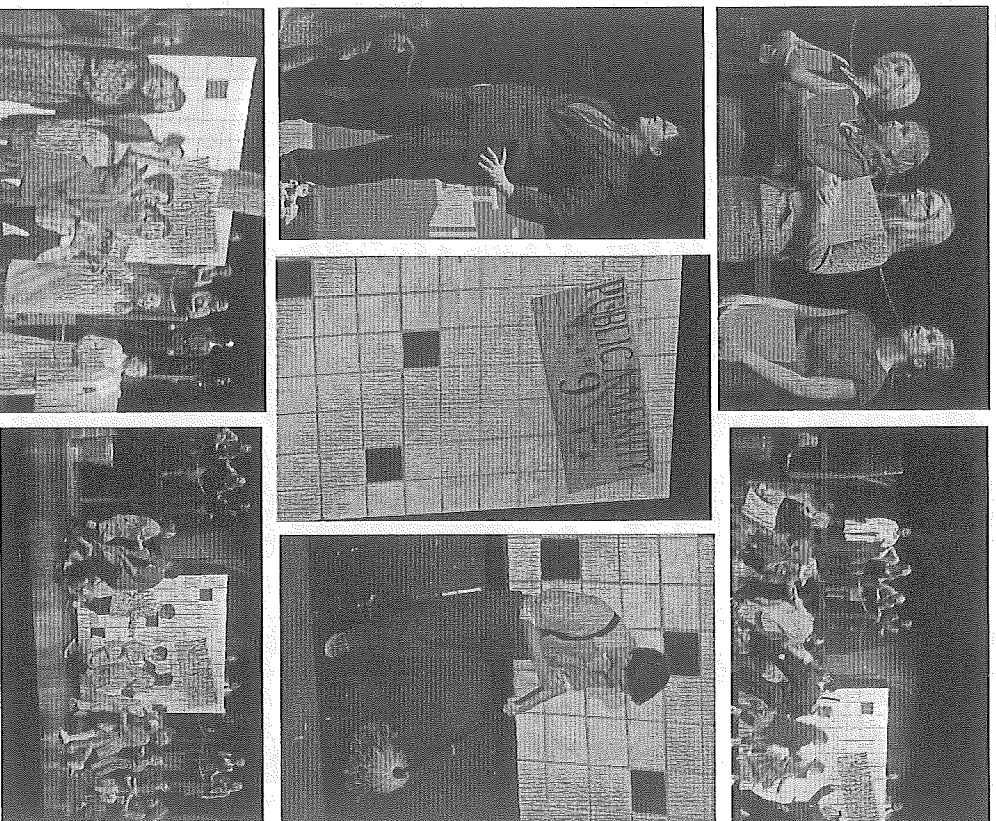

"Karate is a lot of fun to do and I want to experience the competitions and improve in my skills," said Evans.

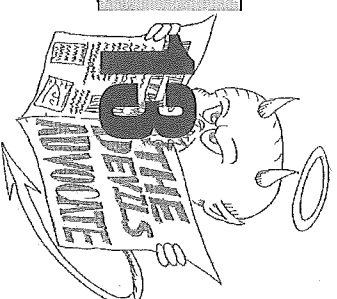

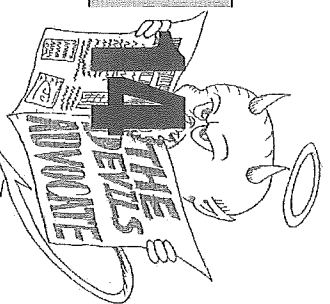

Do things that scare you; you will feel so great about yourself!"

"Don't be too nervous when you audition and just have fun when you are on stage. Find something that relaxes you and gets you pumped before your audition. Enjoy every moment you have on that stage because it comes to an end way too fast."

"Don't be afraid or nervous. Confidence is half the battle. Be sure to rehearse if you get a cutting before the audition so you know what you're doing."

Shelby Stewart says:

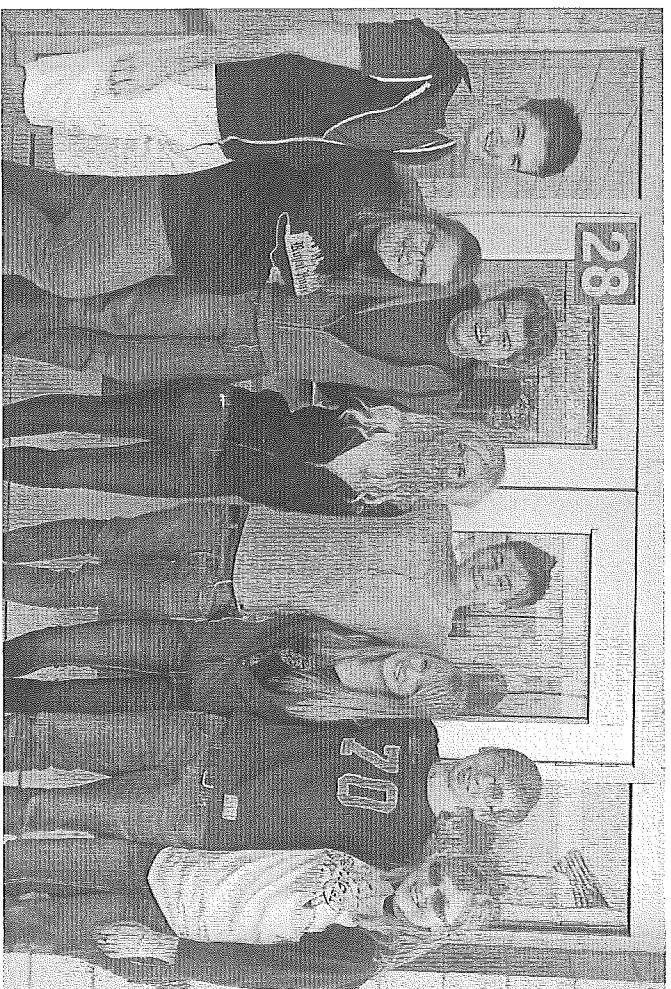
"You'll never know how much you love it until you try. It's always better to go for it than to regret not doing it. You'll never be comfortable with auditioning until you try it for yourself."

Michael Lepior says:

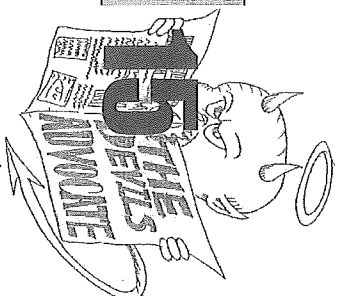
"I hate auditioning personally. It's pretty nerve-wracking, but the best advice I can give is to just be confident and push through it."

Margosian earned a 2nd Degree Black Belt through his training.

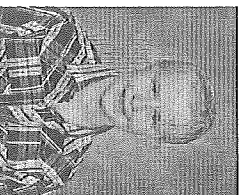

"Karate is a great sport and teaches you a lot about being disciplined and self-control. I miss it, but I love the sports I play now," said Margosian.

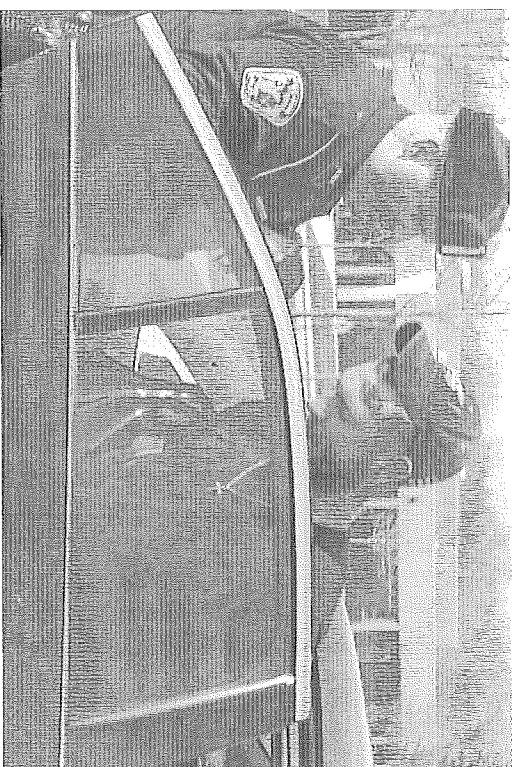

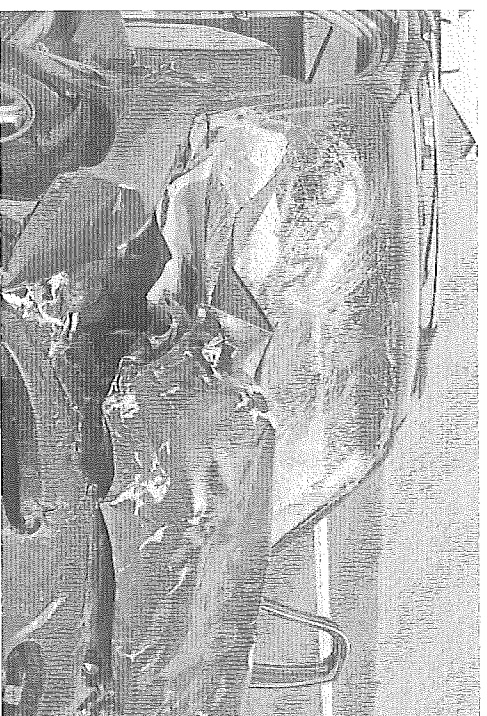
